
## DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

The National Health Security Preparedness Index measures state and national capacity to prepare for, respond to, and recover from emergencies that pose health risks in the United States.




District of Columbia has an overall preparedness level of 7.2, which meets the national average of 7.1.

Health security determines what happens before, during, and after natural disasters, disease outbreaks, or other public health crises. The National Health Security Preparedness Index supports state efforts to reduce health security inequities by identifying strengths and improvement opportunities. The Preparedness Index assesses 140 health security measures such as percentage of bridges in good or fair condition. Together, these measures can inform state and local decision-making, guide quality improvement, and strengthen resilience in all communities.
